OUR HISTORY

Sir David Martin Foundation is a family foundation, dedicated to helping young people in crisis.

Founded by Lady Martin, honouring the vision of her late husband, Sir David Martin, of 'safety, hope and opportunity,' we believe that young people have the capacity to make sustained, positive change, when given the appropriate support.

During his time as Governor of NSW, in a heartfelt address to the Australia Day Council of New South Wales, Sir David expressed his profound concern for the nation's young people:

"...All those youngsters living away from their homes, in the back streets, the tunnels and the gutters, existing on a diet of drugs, violence, sickness and disease, cold, hopelessness and loneliness. That's a big mess to clean, but we shouldn't have let it get so fouled up. Every one of us has to try harder to bring all children up properly and prepare them to inherit Australia from us. These children are our most important assets for Australia's future, yet we are carelessly squandering those assets...."

While in the Vice Regal role, Sir David witnessed many young people caught in the destructive world of drugs, alcohol, homelessness and abuse. As he faced his cancer diagnosis, he wanted to leave a legacy that would give these young people a brighter future. Since 1990, the Foundation has focused on helping young people in crisis. We have:

- Raised over \$75 million for youth addiction programs.
- Funded best practice models of treatment for young people with drug and alcohol addiction.
- Driven the establishment of the first youth specific
 Withdrawal Centre in NSW.
- Launched the Youth Network, a nationwide expansion of Aftercare to keep more young people well, after treatment.

WHAT WE DO

Sir David Martin Foundation is the major philanthropic funder of Mission Australia's Triple Care Farm, a unique youthspecific addiction treatment centre which gives Australians aged 16-24, a safe place to get well and prepare for new opportunities. Here, young people are given a personalised approach to help them on their recovery journey.

Central to our strategy is support of programs that offer a health and holistic approach to youth addiction. This includes Withdrawal, Residential Rehabilitation, and Aftercare. These programs provide a safe place for young people to get well, prepare for new opportunities, and create lasting change in their lives. The Triple Care Farm model of treatment is based on harm minimisation and personalised care, where young people can address the issues that are impacting on their ability to live an addiction-free life.

Treating addiction in Australia requires a national strategy to address the complex landscape of youth addiction and reach every young individual in need. A national strategy will streamline resources, foster collaboration among stakeholders, and ensure that evidence-based approaches are available to all who need help.

Together, with our partners, stakeholders, and the broader community, we aspire to build a brighter future for vulnerable young people, filled with safety, hope and opportunity.



TREATMENT MODELS

The Foundation is the major philanthropic funder of Mission Australia's Triple Care Farm, a unique addiction treatment centre which gives vulnerable young Australians, aged 16-24, a safe place to get well and prepare for new opportunities.

The majority of young people seeking help at Triple Care Farm have underlying mental illness and/or trauma which is often masked by drug and alcohol addiction.

- 24-hour medical withdrawal management is provided in a health accredited clinical setting. Then the young person's needs are addressed through psychosocial treatment, individual and group counselling with on-site access to a GP and an Addiction specialist.
- Residential Rehabilitation includes vocational training and education, living skills and a sport and recreation stream. This holistic, innovative and evidence-based model allows

young people to set their individual goals and build positive relationships and networks.

• Aftercare provides the vital wrap-around support necessary for young people when they return to the community. Here they maintain their goals to re-engage with education and employment, maintain healthy relationships and look after their own health and wellbeing.

WITHDRAWAL







David Martin Place is a youthspecific withdrawal facility providing 24/7 medical support on-site at Triple Care Farm. Young people are supported in a safe, secure and encouraging environment to give them the best chance of long-term success.

Adult withdrawal facilities aren't appropriate for young people who need a safe place to recover. Adult facilities don't address the reasons why young people begin using in the first place or equip them with the tools needed to break the cycle of addiction.

David Martin Place is purposebuilt to meet the specific needs of young people. The detox process can be daunting, but the Withdrawal program ensures that young people have choices and access to the treatment option that best meets their needs. The Withdrawal program aims to provide a safe and supportive environment to withdraw from substances and to connect with long term treatment options to sustain their individual substance use goals.

In 2023 in the Withdrawal program:

- 82 young people were provided care, to safely withdraw from substances in a supportive environment.
- the majority (64%) of the young people moved directly into the Triple Care Farm Residential Rehabilitation program.

BAILEY'S STORY

Bailey found himself at a crossroads; his life derailed by addiction at only 20 years old. A harrowing experience involving his girlfriend's overdose became the catalyst for change. Days later, he entered David Martin Place (DMP), Triple Care Farm's youth-specific withdrawal unit.

Approaching DMP, Bailey felt a mix of fear and hope. "I was still high that day," he recalls truthfully. "I hadn't had a withdrawal yet, because I was high the night before." The reality hit him on the second day, as the structured environment and compassionate staff helped him confront his addiction.

Bailey found comfort in the youth-specific approach of the Withdrawal program. "I knew I was safe after the first day," he shares. The staff's nonjudgemental attitude and the sense of community were crucial to his recovery. He fondly remembers Caroline, a nurse whose humour put him at ease.

The Withdrawal program provided Bailey with a safe space to begin his recovery journey. He learned crucial coping mechanisms and started to understand his addiction. The youth-specific nature of the facility was particularly beneficial, as Bailey felt he could relate to his peers and didn't feel out of place or vulnerable.

During his time at DMP, Bailey began to set goals for his future. With the support of the staff, he started to envision a life beyond addiction. The program's holistic approach, combining medical support with counselling, gave Bailey the tools he needed to prepare for the next stage of his recovery. After completing Withdrawal, Bailey transitioned to Triple Care Farm's twelve-week Residential Rehabilitation program. Despite initial challenges, he thrived, developing strategies to manage cravings and engaging in therapy to confront his past and plan his future.

Today, Bailey's transformation is remarkable. He's excelling in studies, pursuing music, and maintaining strong family relationships. Bailey's journey highlights the importance of safe, supportive environments for young people's recovery.

RESIDENTIAL REHABILITATION

Sir David Martin Foundation is the major philanthropic funder of Mission Australia's Triple Care Farm, aiming to give vulnerable young people a safe place to get well and prepare for new opportunities.

Triple Care Farm's youth-specific drug and alcohol residential rehabilitation helps 16-24 year olds to overcome addiction and develop skills to find their independence in the community. Through Triple Care Farm and the individual's commitment, **young people's lives are saved – moving from a high risk of suicide to hope for a brighter future.**

The Triple Care Farm program provides treatment and support for addiction and mental health issues, as well as opportunities for young people to gain useful skills for their future. By re-engaging with education and building job and living skills, they are better placed to be independent, find employment or go on to do further study.

Triple Care Farm supports young people to experience long-term changes, empowering them to live fulfilling and self-sufficient lives.

Key elements of the program are:









1 Treatment and Counselling

- One-on-one and group therapy
- Art and music therapy for self-expression
- Addresses underlying issues and contributing factors
- Provides coping techniques for addiction and mental health

2 Living Skills

- Shared housing with supervision
- Builds conflict resolution abilities
- Teaches essential domestic and budgeting skills
- Maintaining positive social relationships

3 Vocational and Educational Training

- Accredited and non-accredited VET programs
- Literacy and numeracy lessons
- TAFE Outreach partnership for Certificate II (Skills for Work & Training / Year 10 equivalent)

4 Sport and Recreation

- Fitness training and gym access, to form healthy habits
- Weekend excursions for fun group activities
- Activities include hiking, kayaking, surfing and swimming



KEIRA'S* STORY

At 21, Keira stood at the precipice of despair. Years of substance abuse had left her life in shambles – a string of arrests, hospital visits and broken relationships trailed in her wake. It was in this moment of crisis that she found Triple Care Farm, a lifeline that would transform her future.

The Residential Rehabilitation program at the Farm became Keira's sanctuary. The structured environment provided a stark contrast to the chaos of her life. Here, surrounded by compassionate staff and peers facing similar struggles, Keira began to confront the root causes of her addiction.

The program's holistic approach was unlike anything Keira had experienced before. Daily counselling sessions helped her unpack years of trauma and develop healthy coping mechanisms. Vocational training reignited her passion for learning, while fitness activities restored her physical health. For the first time in years, Keira felt a sense of purpose and hope.

One of the most impactful aspects of the Farm was the sense of community. Keira found solace in group therapy sessions, where she could share her struggles and triumphs with others who truly understood. The bonds formed during her stay became a crucial support network, extending well beyond her time at the Farm.

As Keira progressed through the program, she set ambitious goals for herself. With the guidance of the dedicated staff, she mapped out a plan for her future – one that included completing her education and pursuing a career in landscaping. The program's emphasis on life skills and practical planning gave Keira the tools she needed to turn these dreams into achievable targets.

Today, Keira is committed to her studies, working towards completing her Year 12 qualifications with outstanding results. Her growing stock of plants for her landscaping business and her daily 10km walks are living proof of the healthy habits and entrepreneurial spirit fostered during her time in the program.

Keira's story powerfully demonstrates how individualised, compassionate intervention can transform lives. As Keira continues to thrive, she often reflects on her time at the Farm with gratitude. The program didn't just save her life – it gave her a new one, full of purpose and possibility.

YOUTH NETWORK EXPANSION OF AFTERCARE

Aftercare is an evidence-based six-month wraparound support program to help young people transition safely back in the community after completing residential treatment programs. This vital program helps break the cycle of drug and alcohol addiction and connects more young people with community, housing, education and employment pathways.

Youth Network, an initiative by Sir David Martin Foundation, is an expansion of Aftercare which was driven by high demand and unmet need to help vulnerable young people with drug and alcohol addiction. Thanks to our generous donors and in partnership with Mission Australia, we expanded Aftercare nationally to four youth Residential Rehabilitation sites in Robertson, Perth, Dubbo and Batemans Bay.

All the young people we supported in the first 12 months (January 2023 to December 2023) continue to make real and lasting change. Results include:

- Doubled the number of young people receiving Aftercare from 80 to 161 across all locations
- Broadened the intake age range from 16-24 to 12-24

 Higher representation of LGBTQI+ and Indigenous young people (now 28%)

An independent evaluator is working across all sites to assess the impact and efficacy of the network over a three-year period.

MILLIE'S* STORY

Millie felt weary beyond her 21 years, trapped in a cycle of cannabis use and self-doubt. The strained silence between her and her parents echoed through their home, a constant reminder of the wedge her addiction had driven into their relationship. As another job application went unanswered, Millie realised something had to change.

As her 22nd birthday approached, Millie made a decision that would alter the course of her life. Determined, she checked into Mission Australia's Drug and Alcohol Youth Service (DAYS). It was during this stay that Millie met Brad, the new Aftercare Worker whose compassionate approach would prove instrumental in her recovery. Together, they mapped out a future that once seemed impossible - a stable home life and a career in childcare. For the first time in years, Millie dared to hope.

Returning to the community, Millie found herself better equipped to face the challenges ahead. Brad's unwavering support became her anchor, offering guidance, practical advice, and mentorship as she navigated early recovery. Their weekly sessions became a lifeline, helping Millie stay focused on her goals even when the path seemed daunting.

As weeks turned into months, Millie's transformation became evident. The fog of addiction lifted, revealing a young woman brimming with potential. Communication with her parents improved, mending the fractured relationships that had once seemed beyond repair. The tension in their home was replaced by a newfound warmth and understanding.

Millie's determination paid off when she secured a position as a childcare worker, a dream she had long harboured but never thought possible. Her employer, recognising her passion and dedication, offered her an opportunity that once would have seemed out of reach – the chance to pursue a Degree in Childcare Education.

Now, three months into her Aftercare support, Millie stands at the threshold of a bright future. The daily struggle with addiction has been replaced by a commitment to growth and self-improvement. As she continues her weekly appointments with Brad, Millie reflects on her journey with a mixture of pride and gratitude. With determination and Brad's support, Millie hasn't just turned her life around – she's rewritten her story, one day at a time.

Triple Care Farm is based on 150 acres of farmland, surrounded by native wildlife, with scenic views of the Illawarra escarpment, a calming setting for young people to focus on their recovery goals and to get well.

Q Walawaani, Batemans Bay, NSW

Based on the Triple Care Farm model, this facility opened in February 2023. The Residential Rehabilitation program provides 12 weeks of treatment and support for addiction and mental health issues for young people aged 16-24.

This new facility is based on 17 acres of bushland and is a space where youth in crisis can be nurtured through rehabilitation and given the best chance to break the cycle of addiction.

Drug and Alcohol Youth Service (DAYS), East Perth, WA

The Drug and Alcohol Youth Services (DAYS) is an Integrated Service, offering a multidisciplinary approach in supporting young people to access alcohol and other drug (AOD) treatment options.

Based in the city, offering support to young people from Perth and surrounds, DAYS offers a community-based outpatient service, a short stay Youth Withdrawal and Respite service and a longer stay Residential Rehabilitation service. DAYS is a partnership between Mission Australia and Next Step Drug and Alcohol Services.

Mac River Centre Rehabilitation Program, Dubbo, NSW

Mac River Centre is an intensive youth-specific residential rehabilitation program in Central West NSW. Over three months, the program provides trauma-informed and culturally safe support to young people aged 13 to 18, with a history of significant substance use and offending behaviour.

Mac River is based on 50 acres of land 20km out of Dubbo which adds to the healing atmosphere.

Stigma, judgment, and misinformation are formidable obstacles preventing young people and their families from seeking help for drug and alcohol addiction. Sir David Martin Foundation aims to dismantle these barriers and empower our youth to take the first step towards recovery. The stark reality is that substance addiction remains the world's most stigmatised health condition, according to the World Health Organization.* In Australia, one-third of those struggling with problematic alcohol and drug use never seek help, with 38% under 30 years old.^

Together, we can create a more understanding, supportive society where every young person feels empowered to seek the help they need and deserve.

Awareness campaign

This year, we launched the 'Get Comfortable with the Uncomfortable' campaign to address the stigma surrounding

addiction discussions among youth. Coinciding with Youth Week (April 11-21), this initiative aimed to empower young people to have difficult conversations about drug and alcohol use with their peers. A free toolkit, developed with input from clinical professionals and our Youth Advisory Group, was made available to provide guidance on initiating these conversations safely and effectively. This campaign underscores our commitment to equipping young people with the necessary tools to support their friends and potentially save lives through open dialogue about addiction.

Youth Advisory Group

The Youth Advisory Group, comprising Australians aged 16-29, ensures a strong youth voice guides our efforts to help young people in crisis. The diverse members contribute their passion, experiences, and insights to shape our understanding of youth issues and inform our initiatives. Their input is crucial in addressing the health and wellbeing concerns of young people in our community.
